de: Julia Metropolis Arbeit manifestiert sich sowohl über die jeweiligen skulpturalen Objekte, als auch deren spezifische Installation. Insbesondere in ihren letzten Arbeiten, in Form von großformatigen installativen Skulpturen, geht es speziell darum mit und auf der Wand zu arbeiten. Dabei bilden minimalistische und abstrakte Malereien den Ausgangspunkt Julia Metropolis praktischen, wie theoretischen Untersuchung über die Beziehung zwischen Kunstwerk, Ausstellungsraum und Betrachter*in.

Die Autorität des Minimalismus und dessen Objektivitätsanspruch - *What you see is what you see*, Frank Stella, 1966 - beschäftigen Metropolit im Hinblick auf die Blindstellen und das Unbewusste dieses künstlerischen Programms. Ausgehend von ihren bisherigen Untersuchungen möchte sie Fragen der site-specificity, anhand modularer installativer Objekte, die sich in verschiedene Arten von Architektur und Räumen einpassen können arbeiten. So ist aus einer zeitgenössischen Perspektive der Blick auf die Materialien und Formen des historischen Minimalismus gelenkt. Mithilfe installativer Konstellationen ist so die Konstruktion von Räumen - als Konzepte und Lebens-, wie Arbeitsorte - hinterfragt.

fr: Le travail de Julia Metropolit se manifeste tant dans ses objets sculpturaux que dans leur installation spécifique. Dans ses pièces récentes, qui prennent la forme d'installations grands formats au mur, se dessine une recherche pratique et théorique sur la relation entre objet, espace d'exposition et spectateur·rice·s. L'autorité de l'Art Minimal et sa prétention à l'objectivité - *What you see is what you see* (Frank Stella, 1966) - l'intéressent au regard des angles morts et de l'inconscient qu'un tel programme suppose. À travers ses objets modulaires qui s'adaptent à l'espace construit, elle propose une relecture contemporaine de ses formes et de ses matériaux (géométriques, sériels et industriels) dans une perspective humaine et relationnelle.

Four identical T-shaped objets made of matt quarter-inch round steel rods are set at identical angles against the gallery's white wall.

Three steel rods each measuring one meter from which elongated rectangular frames project one along one side rest on the floor at neat angles.

Two different-sized objects, their shape a hybrid of circle and square, also rest on the floor of the exhibition space in an arrangement suggestive of reflection in a mirror.

« Stabilised », « Merged », and « Reframing » are the titles of these three works by Julia Metropolit. Others might be titled « Double », « Open Space », or « Blind Object ».

The precision with which the elements of these installations are arrayed and the meticulous workmanship of the simple objects, which effaces any trace of the artist's hand in favor of a quasi-industrial standardized look, immediately bring the objects of Donald Judd, Carl André, Sol LeWitt, and other minimalists to mind. That Metropolit took inspiration from minimal art is evident in the reduction to simple « primary structures », the use of industrially manufactured components, and the emphatically serial quality of much of her work. « Serial order, » the critic and curator Mel Bochner proposed in the essay « The Serial Attitude », which appeared in the journal Artforum in 1967, « is a method, not a style ».

The artist, who was born in Cambrai, France, in 1988 and lives and works in Hamburg, does not put her creations on a pedestal and forgoes all the other sculptural gestures that usually serve to elevate art and set it apart from the space around it. She deftly relies on what she finds in place : walls, floors, perhaps the occasional windowstill – nothing else. At most, she will put a nail in wall to hold an object.

And yet Julia Metropolit's art is more than a gently updated variation on the -now thoroughly historic- vocabulary of minimalism. The distinguishing feature of her work is its ironic edge, with glimpses of illogic and odd comedy flashing up here and there. The rigorous order the exponents of minimal art -most of them men- demonstrated ad nauseam repeatedly falters in Metropolit's art : individual elements suddenly step out of line, and the semblance of perfection threatens to fall apart. Looking closely, we often discover that her objects defy the rectangularity and accuracy imposed on them to reveal a sort of individuality, a touch of human character. That impression is reinforced by the artist's use of softer materials with a less technical aura-carpets, rubber, or decorative foil. In combination with titles such as « I Beg to Differ » (2011), they put a fresh and contrarian spin on the quotations from the repertoire of historic minimalism. Julia Metropolit, who graduated from the Ecole Nationale Supérieure des Beaux-Arts de Lyon in 2011, is working toward her master's degree with Thomas Demand at the University of Fine Arts of Hamburg.






